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COURSE OUTLINE

Paragraph 1

R= Reinstate the question

- In your own words, rewrite the question.
- State your thesis*.

Paragraph 2

A= Answer the question

- Provide the answer to your thesis* statement.
- Provide details explaining your thesis*.

Paragraph 3

F= For Example

- Provide supporting evidence from the text, to support your thesis* statement.
- Provide examples to support your text evidence.

Paragraph 4

F= For Example

- Provide supporting evidence from the text, to support your thesis* statement.
- Provide examples to support your text evidence.

Paragraph 5

T= Tie it Up

- Write a conclusion supporting your thesis* from paragraph 1.

*Thesis: A statement supported by arguments and/or evidence.
